A capital campaign is a spiritual work, not a financial one. A campaign is about understanding there is a Kingdom need and a Kingdom provision to meet that need. It's about developing an understanding of God's perfect plan to meet the need through the proper stewardship of His people.

A Capital Campaign Is:

- A program wherein God's people come together in equal sacrifice to provide funds for building.
- A time of spiritual growth and faith-building that stirs the heart and spirit.
- A Biblical process that results in a three-year giving commitment, typically raising between one and three times current annual giving in tithes and offerings.

A capital campaign is not about heavy-handed tactics, brow-beating, trickery, guilt or high-pressure appeals for money. It is a time for learning, spiritual growth and prayerful consideration of how God would have each one of us respond to the need.



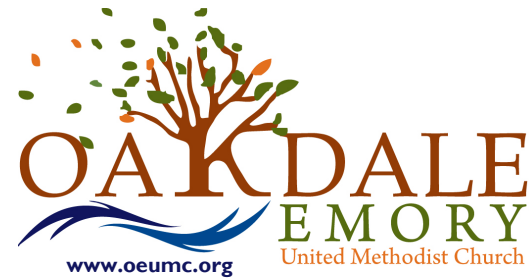
Proposed new Georgia Avenue entrance

Giving Options

Direct gifts, in the form of cash or checks, are the most common way to give to a capital campaign. The chart on the reverse side shows a variety of ways to share your financial blessings now—and in the future.

Think creatively! Using an anticipated tax refund or bonus check for the next three years can help the church without hurting your monthly budget. Scaling back on discretionary expenses also can free up funds for charitable giving. By committing to a simpler lifestyle, many individuals and families discover the grace of more time together and a greater ability to share God's blessings.

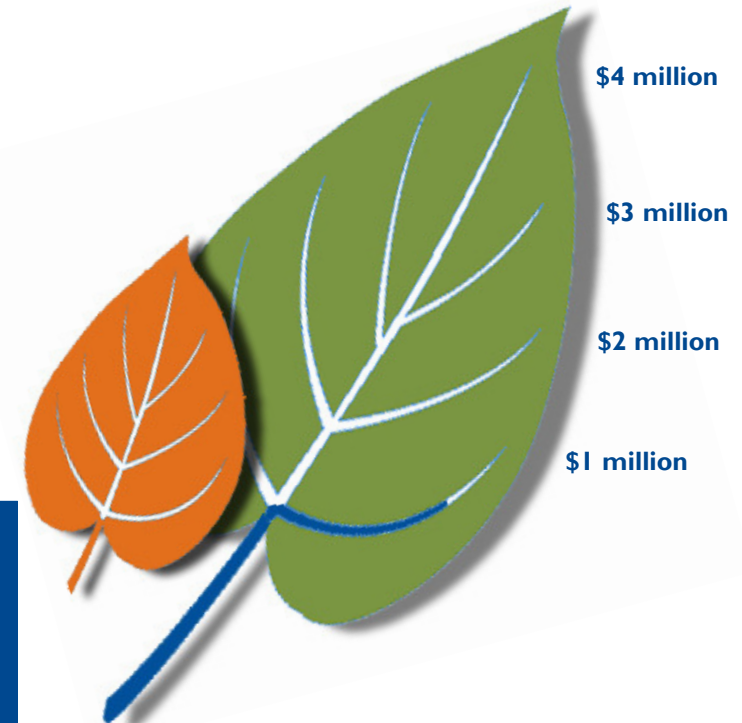
